
Coming and going from School

What to bring to school?

**EVERYTHING YOU BRING INTO SCHOOL
NEEDS TO BE NAMED!**

It is your responsibility to check you have your own belongings.

- PE Kit (Needs to stay in school every day as sometimes we may need it on a different day to your normal PE lessons.)
- Pencil case (pen, pencil, sharpener, ruler, coloured pencils. All items should be named.)
- Home-contact book
- Reading book

What does Year 6 learning look like?

English

By the end of Year 6, pupils are expected to display a solid understanding of punctuation and show they can write in a variety of sentence structures. Their vocabulary must be powerful and display accurate spelling of their words. They must also demonstrate the following skills:

- Speak clearly and confidently for a range of topics and audiences.
- Read independently, compare characters and versions of the same event.
- Discuss viewpoints or fictional characters and their authors.
- Write for a range of purposes and control the structure of their sentences.
- Apply knowledge of linguistic terms to discuss writing and reading.

Maths

By the end of Year 6, pupils are expected to have a good understanding of the following:

- Long multiplication and division.
- Working with fractions, decimals and percentages and ratios.
- Solve a wide range of problems including properties of numbers and arithmetic.
- Solve problems with efficient written and mental calculations.
- Classify shapes with complex geometrical properties and their appropriate vocabulary.
